

U.S. National Endowment for Democracy (NED) in the Whirlwind of Thailand's Anti-Government Movement

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ABSTRACT:This paper examines the nature and characteristics of National Endowment for Democracy (NED) in the United States and attempts to uncover the role NED has played in the whirlwind of the anti-government movement in Thailand. By sorting out the composition of NED personnel and funding programs, it is found that it is using various social forces it cultivates or collects in the target country under the banner of so-called democracy to create social chaos, thus achieving the purpose of disrupting the order of the target country.

I. INTRODUCTION

The National Endowment for Democracy (NED) was established in 1983 with the purpose of exporting democracy to countries or regions outside the United States. NED's main source of funding is the annual appropriation from the U.S. Congress, and the main channel is through the U.S. Information Agency. The anti-government movement that erupted in Thailand in 2020 and continues to this day is not only under the shadow of the U.S. NED, but is also directly manipulated and implemented by the NED through its proxies. [1]2018-2019 NED grants to Thailand's so-called democracy movement programs totaled \$3,961,500, which translates into over 193 million baht. The NED has not only provided financial support, but has also cultivated a large number of anti-government organizations, established a well-developed media network that reaches even into the impoverished ISAAN in eastern Thailand, and cultivated anti-government elements on the grounds of democracy. The U.S. NED has allocated up to \$400,000 to its affiliate IRI for systematic cultivation and planning of anti-government

movement programs in Thailand. Its purpose is to create an anti-government force in Thailand at the behest of the United States, which it glorifies in its program as "democratic participation in citizen-centered governance". The "citizens" here are not U.S. citizens but Thai citizens, i.e., the U.S. NED's plan to govern Thai citizens directly through proxies is a naked challenge to Thailand's sovereignty and unity of governance. The U.S. wants to go beyond the Thai government to govern its citizens directly. The most direct way is then to use the various forces it has cultivated or co-opted in Thai society under the banner of so-called democracy to create domestic chaos in Thailand for the purpose of overthrowing the Thai government and subverting the constitutional monarchy.

II. U.S. NED'S SUPPORT AND INFLUENCE ON THAILAND'S ANTI-GOVERNMENT MOVEMENT NED'S VOLUNTEER AND VOLUNTEER SERVICE PROGRAMS IN THAILAND

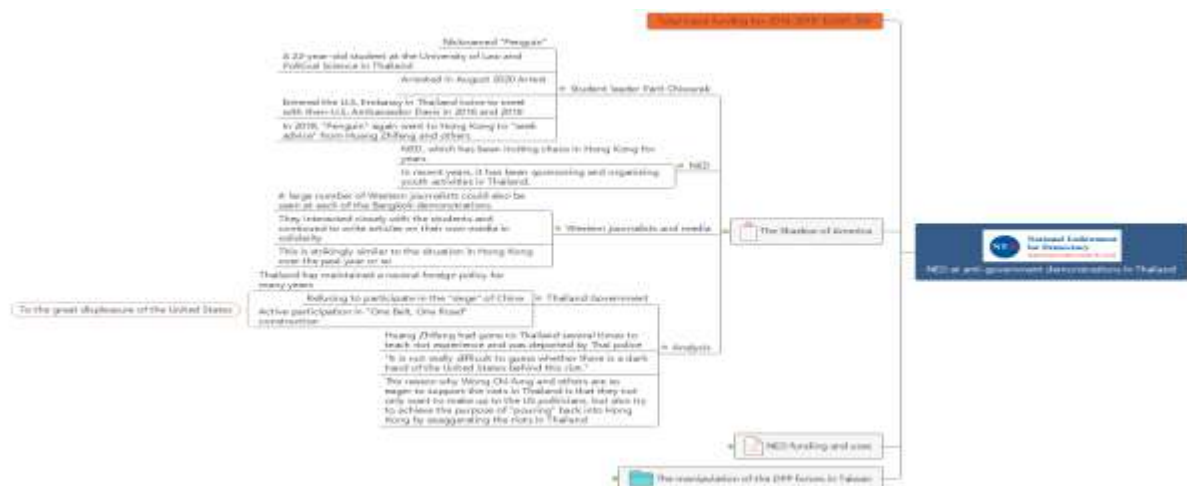
[2]On October 27, 2020, following the transfer of Michael George DeSombre from Hong Kong, China, to Thailand as U.S. Ambassador to the Kingdom of Thailand, the famous Thai musician Ms. Haladai went to the entrance of the U.S. Embassy in Thailand to participate in a pro-King rally and called on the U.S. not to interfere in Thailand's internal affairs or cause divisions within Thailand. Michael George DeSombre himself was one of the ringleaders behind the riots in Hong Kong. At the time, the U.S. Embassy in Thailand responded that the U.S. had previously issued an announcement identifying the U.S. government as not having provided financial support to the rally, individuals or political parties, but as supporting the

democratic process and the rule of law. The "democratic rule of law process" here refers to NED's support for the organizations and forces behind the anti-government movement in Thailand under the banner of "democracy, rule of law, and human rights. The U.S. has established the "Volunteers for Human Rights" program in Thailand, which explicitly states in its objectives "to support the development of a new generation of human rights activists as volunteers and civil society organizations" and operates mainly in the form of "workshops to train Thai democracy volunteers. These so-called "volunteers" have played an important role in all the anti-government movements in Thailand and can achieve the effect of confusing the public. For example, on February 1, the day of the coup in Burma, about 200 so-called "people" (hired actors) gathered in front of the Burmese Embassy in Thailand to protest the takeover of power by the Tatmadaw. Members of We Volunteer and supporters of Burma's substantive leader, Ung San Suu Kyi, made up half of the crowd. They were as young as 19-20 years old when they used stones and other objects to pelt riot police during the demonstration. The demonstration resulted in 15 police officers being injured, two of whom were in serious condition.[3] These so-called "volunteers" issued a statement saying, "Thailand can in no way endorse this coup or recognize the legitimacy of the junta. As ASEAN members, we can no longer remain silent after such an unfortunate and illegal action. We will not accept the coup, no matter who initiated it." This is a good example of what NED has actually done. According to the information, NED has invested more than US\$200,000 or 6.5 million baht in the so-called

"human rights volunteers" and "Thai volunteer services" in Thailand in the past three years. In addition, NED has also invested a large amount of money in the training of Thai trade unions and farmers, a program called Solidarity Center (SC), which is related to the extensive participation of laborers and farmers in the basic forces of Thailand's successive anti-government movements. continues to grow to over \$830,000 (about 25 million baht), with an explosive increase in 2010.

NED'S "YOUNG THAI STUDENT MOVEMENT LEADERS" DEVELOPMENT PROGRAM

NED has a program to support young student movement leaders in Thailand, called the "Democracy Empowerment Program for Young Thai Activists". The annual funding is about \$40,000 (about 1.2 million baht). Parit Chiwarak, a 22-year-old Thai law student nicknamed "Penguin" and the leader of a student movement trying to overthrow the Thai government, is a participant in this program. He visited the U.S. Embassy in Thailand twice, in 2016 and 2018, to meet with then-U.S. Ambassador Davis, and in 2018, Penguin went to Hong Kong to intervene with Joshua Wong Chi-fung and other "Hong Kong independence" activists. Joshua Wong Chi-fung and others were invited by Chulalongkorn University to speak in Thailand in 2016 as part of the NED's so-called Global Partnership for Democracy, a program to strengthen civil society for democracy. This program is also at the root of the restlessness and frequent mobbing of Thai high school and university students.

NED's contribution to the TLHR project is accompanied by the ENLAWTHAI Foundation, which supports legal aid for environmental rights and community empowerment, with the aim of raising public awareness of environmental, legal, and human rights. Both funds are invested in excess of \$110,000 per year (approximately 3.3 million baht+.) TLHR was established in 2014, 2 days after the fall of the Yinglakhinnawat government, with the support and funding of the U.S. Embassy in Thailand and NED. The organization has been on the NED's funding list for a long time, and as the anti-government movement in Thailand intensified, it gradually began to operate "invisibly" in an attempt to rid itself of evidence of manipulation by the NED.

The ringleader temporarily detained by Thai police during the August 7, 2020 pro-democracy demonstration rally worked for TLHR. And the Western media is closed-mouthed about his relationship with TLHR. After his detention, the Thai Forward Party's party-recommended MP Kanun arrived at the court site, where he said he had brought some of his property to bail out Anon, thus showing that the forces behind the anti-government centralized rule." This is a forged message with processed, shielded key facts. The Milk Tea Alliance is not a spontaneous organization of netizens, but a NED-supported organization led by Taiwan's Democratic Progressive Party (DPP) government, with the participation of Taiwan's Ministry of Foreign Affairs, Taiwan's Ministry of Education, Taiwan's Ministry of Culture, and Hong Kong independence activists. "It is a NED-supported organization led by the Taiwan DPP government with the participation of the Ministry of Foreign Affairs, the Ministry of Education, the Ministry of Culture, and Hong Kong independence activists. The Taiwan Foundation for Democracy funded the organization, which was jointly planned and established by Thai anti-government scholars in Taiwan, and then integrated the "Taiwan Independence", "Hong Kong Independence", "Tibetan Independence", and "Hong Kong Independence" groups. "The Taiwan Foundation for Democracy (TFD) was founded in cooperation with Thai anti-government scholars in Taiwan. The organization has launched cyber warfare and offline targeted tailing, tracking, and surveillance by anti-government and terrorist forces. They often launch technical attacks, information warfare, cyber stalking, cyber intimidation, cyber insults, cyber scandal, cyber-criminal abetting, and cyber blackmail on online social media. Offline, the members of the "Milk Tea Alliance" are very diverse. In addition to the above-mentioned regular

movement are intricate and complex, and the rhetoric that the U.S. does not interfere in Thailand's internal affairs is simply a lie.

III. MILK TEA ALLIANCE, WHICH CONDUCTS "CYBER WARFARE" AND OFFLINE SPY OPERATIONS WITH THE SUPPORT OF THE U.S. NED

MILK TEA ALLIANCE IS NOT A SPONTANEOUS ORGANIZATION

Initially formed by Internet users in Thailand, Hong Kong and Taiwan in April 2020, it was later joined by Internet users from other Asian countries such as Japan, Malaysia and India, forming an alliance of over 10 countries and regions, initially as an online front against the ideology of the Chinese Communist Party in mainland China, and later extended to become a front against

work, they also target overseas leaders and opinion leaders, experts and scholars, and track down overseas leaders who do not agree with their positions. They use all their power to personally attack experts and scholars who support the government and dare to speak out. For example, since its birth, Milk Tea Alliance has been propagating anti-Chinese propaganda, provoking Sino-Thai relations, creating conflicts between the two countries and their people, and even combining with local triad organizations to achieve its goals. The Milk Tea Alliance is a group of scattered individuals who have both a core cadre and random participants in a "cyber-attack alliance" under the banner of "democracy". The "cyber-attack alliance" and the "offline spy alliance" are the "satanic" alliance of several evil organizations.

FROM THE FORMATION OF THE TFD-MILK TEA ALLIANCE TO THE HYPE OF VOA IN THE UNITED STATES

The Milk Tea Alliance officially entered the public eye in April 2020. At that time, Hong Kong was in a state of constant violence and terrorism, with many British and American agents and disruptive elements such as Kwok Wing-kong, Wong Chi-fung, Sham Chi-kit and Lai Chi-ying operating rampantly. At the same time, China was preparing to introduce a national security law for Hong Kong, and NED was deeply concerned about the crisis of its presence in Hong Kong and was

already planning to shift its platform. The best country in Asia for a platform is Thailand. In 2018-2019 alone, NED has invested more than \$3.9 million (approximately 117.78 million baht) in building the platform of the so-called "democracy movement" in Thailand, and NED's Asian youth movement network has chosen Hong Kong and Taiwan as its home base after weighing the options of integration. When the base camp in Hong Kong was about to be destroyed, NED chose Taiwan's Tsai Ing-wen government as the agent to lead the establishment of a new organization, and Taiwan is responsible for organizing and funding the organization is TFD, TFD by Taiwan's "Ministry of Foreign Affairs" in 2003 to form Taiwan's "Ministry of Foreign Affairs." The TFD was established in 2003 by Taiwan's Ministry of Foreign Affairs, which contributes NT\$150 million annually. TFD's primary mission is to implement the U.S. Indo-Pacific Strategy and to act as the U.S. human rights handlers in the Asia-Pacific region, using the U.S. so-called "human rights" and "democracy" standards to interfere in the internal affairs of Asia-Pacific countries with the NED. But far from being satisfied with this, the Milk Tea Alliance has planned to mobilize a wide range of Thai high school students, university students, labor groups, and communities to participate in its planned anti-government movement in Thailand, with the goal of overthrowing the Thai government and subverting the Thai constitutional monarchy system of state.

The "Milk Tea Alliance" is a branch of the Taiwan Foundation for Democracy (TFD), which was established with the primary mission of undermining the "China-Thailand family" relationship of mutual trust and cooperation between China and Thailand. With the support of Taiwan's Ministry of Education and Ministry of Culture, the Milk Tea Alliance began to have a clear, highly targeted and systematic dissemination and infiltration program with the extensive response and participation of Taiwan University, Taiwan Normal University, National Chengchi University, and Taiwan's FoGuang University. The DPP, Time Force, and other "Taiwan independence" parties have appointed agents to participate in the program. Through various forms of cultural exchanges, educational exchanges, and the formation of anti-Thai alliances in Taiwan, the NED has assisted in the large-scale infiltration of Thailand and neighboring Burma. The Milk Tea Alliance is not a "network water army" organization or a spontaneous organization of netizens, but a highly destructive secret service organization with tight leadership, good at concealing itself, O2O model, and the participation of a large number of Taiwanese and

NED'S SUPPORT FOR MILK TEA ALLIANCE

The so-called Asian Youth Movement Network (AYMN) is a project of the NED under its various programs, including the Café Democracy Project, "Promoting Dialogue for Democratic Values," "Strengthening Regional Networks for Democracy and Human Rights," and "Strengthening the Capacity of Youth Activists for Democracy." The NED has made significant investments under its various programs, including the Café Democracy Project, which promotes dialogue and democratic values, the Strengthening Regional Networks for Democracy and Human Rights, and the Strengthening the Capacity of Young Activists for Democracy. NDI's funding under the "Supporting Political Parties and Civil Dialogue for Democratic Governance" program alone exceeded \$440,000 (over 13.28 million baht). The Asia Free Election Fund, which supposedly supports youth participation in the

democratic process but actually uses the anti-government movement model to hold the government accountable and develop radicals and students, invested US\$85,000 (over 2.56 million baht) in 2019 alone, while the Asia Free Election Fund invested US\$100,000 (over 3.02 million baht) in 2019 alone. The NED's support for Thailand's anti-government movement was not overnight, it even accompanied a generation of people growing up, which has a distinct nature of peaceful evolution and color revolution. The TFD's Milk Tea Coalition will follow any country, government, or organization that the U.S. believes should be opposed to actively cooperate with the NED's plan, which is Cooperate with the U.S. White House's strategic plan.

MILK TEA ALLIANCE IMPLEMENTS STRATEGIC PLANNING PROJECT IN TAIWAN AMIDST THAILAND'S ANTI-GOVERNMENT MOVEMENT

NED's agent, Taiwan's Ministry of Education, intervenes in and supports the anti-government movement in Thailand. The Hoover center for East Asian Democracy at National Taiwan University, a leading university research institute in Taiwan, is a key partner of the NED and a key partner of Transparency International.[7] NED's affiliate, NDI, provided funding to National Taiwan University (NTU) to host a lecture entitled "The Price to Pay? How Authoritarianism in Thailand Triggered Anti-Establishment Protests", presented by Assistant Professor Janjira Sombatpoonsiri of the Institute of Asian Studies at Chulalongkorn University and co-presented by Assistant Professor Huang Kai-ping of the Department of Political Science at National Taiwan University and Distinguished Professor Ho Ming-hsiu of the Department of Sociology at National Taiwan University. The professor from Chulalongkorn University in Thailand spoke about "Thai authoritarianism paradoxically creates the conditions for promoting and sustaining the struggle for democracy", providing Taiwan's DPP management and NED with a judgment on the trends in Thailand and advice for intervention in Thailand.

During the anti-government movement in Thailand, Chung Shih-fang, an associate professor at the School of Communication, National Chengchi University in Taiwan, was a visiting scholar at the Faculty of Arts, Chulalongkorn University in Thailand from 2014-2012 and has extensive ties to Thai society. She conducted a campaign entitled "Thai Milk Tea Pop Music and Protest" with the support of Taiwan's Ministry of Culture. She is the

main planner of the music section of the "Milk Tea Alliance". Through music festivals and other forms, she has been using music to incite the pro-democracy movement in ASEAN countries under the guise of art, and has been collecting extensive information on Thai society through Thai nationals Kongpob Areerat and Thanom Chapakdee, participating in and inciting the anti-government movement in Thailand in an attempt to subvert the Thai government.

Fan Yun, an associate professor of Taiwan University, a member of the DPP, an ally of Tsai Ing-wen, and a "Taiwan independence" activist, has planned, organized, and implemented the TATD program against Thailand, in an attempt to blatantly subvert the Thai regime through the so-called "democracy movement" and threaten Thailand's national security! Yang Tsung-rong, an associate professor at Taiwan Normal University and a diehard member of the Democratic Progressive Party's "Taiwan independence", participated in the "Hong Kong independence" riots, and in the "Thailand anti-government" campaign, he and Fan Yun jointly planned and directed the school movement in an attempt to subvert the Thai government. Yang also has ties to the Falun Gong organization and is supported by its media.

Chen Shangmao, an associate professor at Taiwan's FoGuang University, has been actively implementing Tsai Ing-wen's new southward strategy for years, traveling extensively to China, the Philippines, Thailand, and Indonesia to gather intelligence. In this anti-government movement in Thailand, he played the role of "godfather" and taught the participants of the student movement: "If the Thai student movement wants to succeed, it must enhance its bargaining and fighting ability internally (combining with other groups, going out of campus, occupying the streets, and protesting for a long time) and strengthen the ties of the Milk Tea Alliance externally (uniting with more countries). To succeed, the movement must continue to exert pressure on the Thai government from both the internal and external sides." Active planning and incitement to subvert the Thai government.

CASE OF OFFLINE STALKING AND SABOTAGE ACTION OF MILK TEA ALLIANCE

When some members of the Milk Tea Coalition started the wave of "opposing independence and promoting reunification" among overseas Chinese, Chinese and international students, they chose to infiltrate successful agents to target overseas leaders and make up facts and personal attacks through the Internet. They followed

overseas media related to "opposing independence and promoting unification" and attacked them. They disrupt the dissemination of statements that have a strong "anti-independence, pro-unification" stance. Adopt a close and personal approach to carry out long-term stalking and sabotage operations. This has caused overseas Chinese leaders to be very apprehensive about speaking out. People in the Milk Tea Coalition are often associated with the local triad system, even trading guns and organizing drug trafficking. Thai police have recently uncovered major drug trafficking cases where the bosses behind them are Taiwanese, or even fugitives from Taiwan. The new characteristics of a high degree of online and offline cooperation are formed, and it is a new type of secret agent organization with mobility with secret operations and destructive power.

IV. TAIWAN ALLIANCE FOR THAI DEMOCRACY (TATD), A SUBVERSION OF THE THAI REGIME CARRIED OUT BY TAIWAN WITH THE SUPPORT OF THE U.S. NED

Tatd Is The Fifth Column Of The Ned And Taiwan's Democratic Progressive Party To Implement The U.S. "Indo-Pacific Strategy" To Disrupt Asia

Taiwan Alliance for Thai Democracy (TATD) is a group of Thai students studying in Taiwan, Taiwanese students and the so-called "allies for democracy" of both, i.e., the commanders and agents of NED and TFD, established under the support and control of TFD, an agent of NED in the United States. The mastermind and formal president of TATD is Mr. AkrawatSiripattanachok, a Thai student living in Taipei, a radical who studied at the University of Law and Political Science in Thailand from 2012-2015 and was selected by the U.S. NED under the "Radical Orientation and Coordination Program to Support Youth Participation in the Democratic Process. He was selected by the U.S. NED under the "Radical Orientation and Coordination Program to Support Youth Participation in the Democratic Process" and trained through the "Strengthening Young Activists' Capacity to Promote Democracy" program as a pool of future NED talent for so-called "democratic revolutions" (color revolutions). NED's investment in two programs in Thailand is approximately \$140,000 a year, or about 4.22 million baht or more. This continued investment has already made a huge impact in Thailand. According to the Bangkok Post in the article "Asian radicals spread pro-democracy message and show support for Thai peers,"

"Especially among young radicals, the Democracy Coalition is thriving. on August 16, some 10,000 youth-led protesters gathered at the Democracy Monument in Bangkok" Meanwhile TATD, with the support of the Taiwan Green Party, one of the NED agents, the Taipei-based NGO Covenants Watch, and a professor from Taiwan Normal University, gathered more than 250 people to besiege Taipei Station and complete a scheduled scripted speech by eight NED and TFD agents from Thailand, Hong Kong, China, Taiwan, and Singapore, who demanded that the military-backed of the government not to threaten Thai citizens. The TATD president, however, not only intensified his anti-Thai government propaganda, but also touched on China's Taiwan issue and attacked the KMT from the DPP's standpoint. He said, "We all agree that Taiwan is one of the best democracies in Asia. They have an active civil society and a good political system. But Taiwan has suffered from the authoritarian repression of the KMT, which ruled for decades in a white terror." He also spoke of his long-term goal of creating a "pan-Asian democratic alliance" between Thailand, Hong Kong, Taiwan, China, Singapore and other countries to counter the so-called anti-authoritarianism. Specifically, against the Thai royal family, against the Prayuth government, against the Chinese government, against all the so-called "authoritarian" governments in Asia by U.S. standards, and against all of Asia by U.S. plans. The essence of this goal is to use violence and color revolutions to create pro-American groups of countries in Asia. In its propaganda document, TATD writes: Please join us and use Taiwan's democratic freedom and experience to express support for the pro-democracy movement of Thai students! We demand that Thailand dissolve its parliament, establish a democratic constitution, support Hong Kong's so-called "democracy movement" against the Chinese government and the Chinese Communist Party, and support Hong Kong's so-called self-determination (Hong Kong independence). The TATD is actually a "democracy" banner under the control of the US NED, serving the US "Indo-Pacific Strategy". The TATD is a fifth column, a secret service organization under the control of the U.S. NED under the banner of "democracy" and in the service of the U.S. "Indo-Pacific Strategy" that creates chaos in Asian countries and promotes radicalism, confrontation, and violence with the aim of subverting the regimes of Asian countries.

TATD'S COLLUSION AND ACTIVITIES IN THE BURMESE COUP

TATD and the Taiwan Democratic Progressive Party (DPP) held a press conference titled "Solidarity with Thailand, the people make the decision" at National Taiwan University on October 22, 2020. Taiwan's legislator and chief of the Time Force National Congress caucus of the "Taiwan Independence" political party, Chiu Hsien-chi; Hong Kong's independent organization "Taiwan Border City Youth Organization", Guan Doya; Tibetan independent organization "Tibet-Taiwan Human Rights Link", Zhaxi Tsering; and Malaysian youths. Zhaxi Tsering; Malaysian youth organization Liang Shengyu; Thai TATD spokesperson and Taipei National University of the Arts student Nachi; Taiwan Platform for Democracy and Sustainability Lin Chien; and Taiwan People's Party's Lai Heungling Office Director Lin Ju-hui. These people, who are nominally in "solidarity with Thailand" but in fact aim to overthrow the Thai government, are constantly attacking the Thai royal family and the Thai government in the TATD media. In fact, they are taking money from NED and TFD to carry out the U.S. mission of peaceful evolution and color revolution to disrupt those countries that are peaceful and stable. In November, TATD organized a sharing session on the experience of the Pan-Asian Thai democracy movement by Taiwan Kaohsiung City Councilor Huang Jie and others. It was attended by many representatives of the Thai-Burmese student and labor community, including Lilly Eithwe, a Burmese nurse from Vibharam Hospital in Thailand.

BURMESE STUDENT COMMUNITY IN THAILAND IN THE GRIP OF CRISIS

Following the coup in Burma on February 1, 2021, the NED issued the "Defending Democracy in Burma: A Joint Statement of Global Democracy Organizations" on February 5, calling for financial capital elite, technology elite and CIA intelligence elite.

ELITE 2 IN DEMOGRAPHIC MODELING AND COMPUTER SCIENCE AT AMERICAN UNIVERSITY

international intervention in Burma's internal affairs in the name of defending democracy. The day after the NED's statement, there was a lot of propaganda from TATD organizations applying the Thai anti-government model against the Burmese military government, and at the same time, the Burmese student community in Thailand began to move, starting a big caucus in Southeast Asia, including Vietnam, Laos, Burma, and Thailand, and activating online independent media to show pictures of protesters gathering. Burmese in Thailand began to accelerate their contacts with Taiwan, and Taiwan responded with "Taiwan Help". The Burmese student community in Thailand began submitting submissions to TATD for funding - 288 people holding protest paper slogans with their faces on (some wearing masks). TATD's role in the event is clear, as is TATD's linkage to the DPP government in Taiwan and the NED in the U.S.

George J. Tenet is currently chairman of Allen & Company LLC, a private investment bank based in New York. Prior to that, Tenet served as director of the 18th Directorate of the Central Intelligence Agency from 1997 to 2004. George John Tenet is the former Director of Central Intelligence for the U.S. Central Intelligence Agency and Distinguished Professor of Diplomacy at Georgetown University. Tenet held the position of Director of Intelligence from 1997 to 2004, making him the longest-serving CIA Director since Allen Dulles, who Tenet admits directly led the only CIA-
